This conference is always very useful. Learning from my colleagues is invaluable. They understand CSU specific issues. I'd prefer to meet in person, if possible.


The agenda, spacing/timing, and people were great.



Thanks for putting together a valuable group of presentations!


Virtual works well. I'm wondering if we can offer a hybrid format in future years. This could increase participation.
