# Why Digital Exhibits and Digital Projects?

SJSU has an institutional repository **AND** a digital collection management system - **why** do we need different tools for digital exhibits and digital projects?

- **Flexibility**

- Design and user experience
- Information architecture
- Metadata implementation
- One-off integration with external tools

- Work with collections from outside SJSU

- Work with objects that “don’t fit”

- Transcriptions
- Excerpts



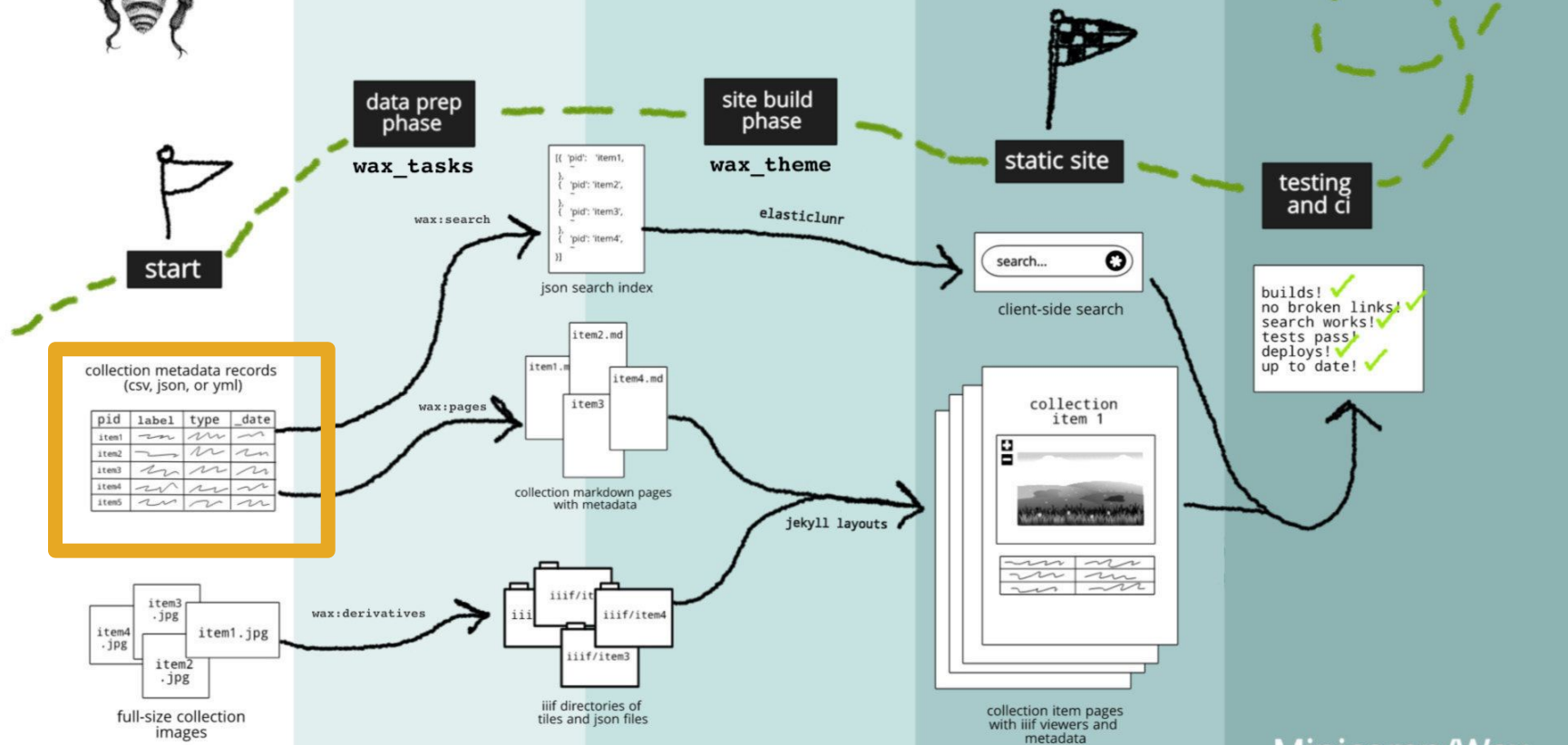
# Piloting Wax

- Compared to other available platforms, Wax is unique in adopting **minimal computing** principles
- **Wax** starts with the static site generator **Jekyll** and adds features specific to digital exhibits and digital humanities projects
- Wax sites can be built on a laptop or desktop and hosted for free on GitHub Pages, or on other available server space

# Key Workflow Elements

- Subject matter experts can create metadata in spreadsheets
- Interpretive materials can be edited in Markdown (like a Wikipedia page) and can include collection items

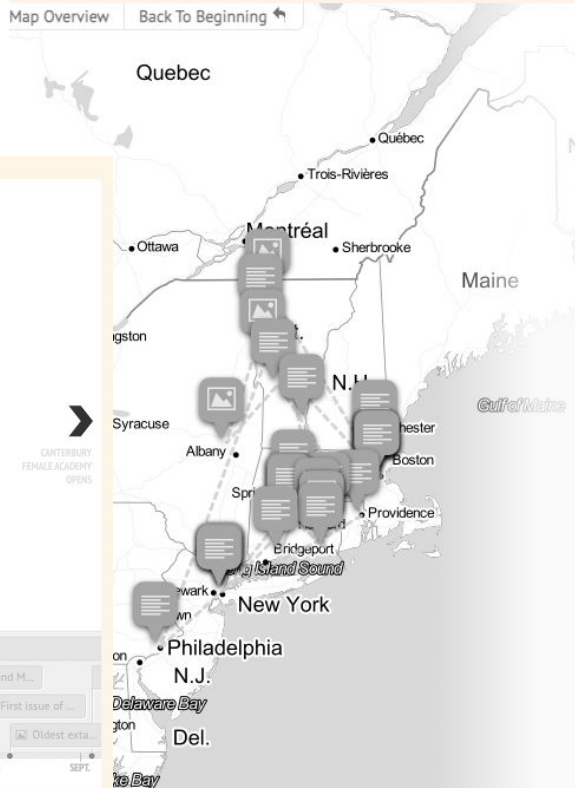

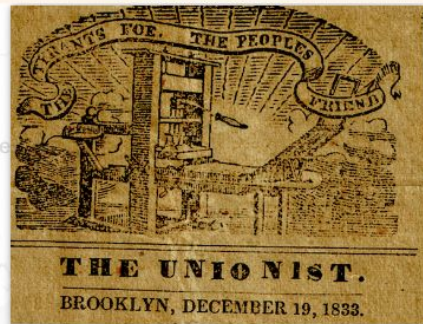

## MAJOR EVENTS IN THE LIFE OF THE UNIONIST

The *Unionist* functioned in the environment of the Canterbury Female Academy, a bold Abolitionist venture in higher education for Black women that took place over eighteen months in 1833-1834.



CANTERBURY FEMALE ACADEMY OPENS



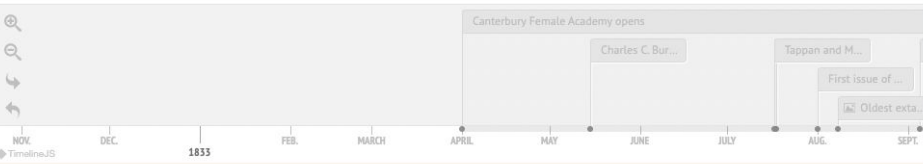
Masthead and Slogan of *The Unionist*, December 19, 1833 Published in Brooklyn Connecticut
