Building a Partnership Across Institutions

- Teamwork: Combining Canvas know-how (Michelle & Aloha at Cabrillo College) with primary source content (Tanya at LARC)
- Working Meetings on Zoom to create space and time
- Using <u>Google Sheets</u> for outline & source descriptions
- One semester to build a module & one semester to pilot (it helps if one of you is on a sabbatical!)
- Partnering with faculty for feedback and topics

Using Canvas Across Institutions

- Export Import across institutions: time consuming and did not allow for synchronous editing, our favored mode
- Collaboration in Canvas Free-for-Teacher: <u>https://www.instructure.com/try-canvas</u>
- Using <u>Canvas Commons</u> (rather than SFSU/CSU Commons) to share publicly
- "Send To" to share with faculty at your institution

Our first Canvas Module:

The Watsonville Canneries Strike: Primary Sources

- Led predominately by around 1,000 Mexican and Mexican-American women, in 1985-1987
- They fought against the cannery owners, the powerful agribusiness machine, and their own union, the Teamsters, which had become entrenched and unresponsive
- After striking for 18 months, strikers' rejected an initial poor settlement negotiated by the union, pushing back against larger pay cuts and winning medical benefits for all workers, seniority rights, and striker amnesty
- They gained organizing and leadership skills, and a voice in the future of their community

THE FROZEN FOOD STRIKE

In Watsonville about 1,000 frozen food workers have been on strike for ten months. Most of us are Mexicanas and Chicanas and we went out on strike when Watsonville Canning reduced our wages from \$6.66 an hour to \$4,25 and gutted our benefits. Four months ago our brothers and sisters at Shaw Frozen Food accepted a contract that dropped their wages from \$7.06 to \$5.85 and reduced their benefits. Now, workers throughout the frozen food industry are being told to accept a wage somewhere between \$5.85 and the \$5.05 that Watsonville

Canning is paying their scabs. And who knows how low the wages will

We are struggling to maintain our wages and benefits at their previous levels. We are fighting against the scabs at Watsonville Canning and we are reaching out to other workers for support.

fall after that?

OUR LOSS IS YOUR LOSS TOO

Workers in the fields have also had their wages reduced. When the bosses in this area saw that Watsonville Canning was breaking our strike with scabs, they reduced their workers' wages too, figuring that workers were powerless to do anything about it. We will continue to see the material level of our lives fall until we unite together and win some major battles against the employers.

The scabs who are now working at Watsonville Canning are the enemies of all workers, especially those of us who work in the canneries and the fields. If you know someone who is scabbing, denounce them. We must let them know that our community can not tolerate those who break our strikes.

HOW CAN WE LIVE?

The bosses face their own crisis. The competition among them is worse and worse. They hope to solve their problems by reducing our wages and benefits.

But we have our own problems. How can we afford to accept these reductions when the cost of everything continues to rise? How are we going to live as our wages go down at the same time that food prices go up, rent goes up, the cost of everything goes up?

UNITED WE CAN WIN

Frozen food workers and farmworkers must unite. We are united in our language and in our culture, and now we must unite in our struggles. It doesn't matter what union we are in, or even if we are in no union at all. We can not let the bosses and some union officials divide us. Watsonville Canning can not run if Farmworkers do not cut the brocoli and cauliflower that the scabs process. A victory for the workers at Watsonville Canning will be a victory for all of us.

Dolores Huerta, Vice-President of the Hnited Farm Workers will speak a noon rally, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1969, on the speaker's platform , along with North Beachs', Cesar's Sextet.

The strike and the grape boycott, now going into the fifth year of struggle, have been waged continually by the grape workers of Delano, California sgainst grape growers in the area who have refused to meet with their workers. These workers, since they are non-unionized and have no labor legislation covering their many gretwances in working and accial conditions, have no alternative but an economic boycott of the product they pick, GRAFES.

The grape boycott has recently been waging it's attack against the Defense Department's, ludicurss buying of table grapes for "our boys in Victnam". SINCE WHEN DID THEY BECOME HUNGRY FOR TABLE GRAPES!

In more recent developments, the Food and Drug Administration has taken no action, so far, sgainst chain stores who continue to handle table gropes, which have been sprayed with postonous insecticides.
